Just as important, adults need to supervise young people when they ride and make sure they are riding an ATV that is the appropriate size for them. It makes sense – youth-sized ATVs are lighter, smaller and better!

After all, showing kids how to do it right teaches them to stay safe, stay in control and have fun.

MAKE ATV SAFETY A PRIORITY FOR YOUR FAMILY

USE THESE 7 SIMPLE GUIDELINES WHEN LETTING YOUR CHILD RIDE AN ATV

Know Their Limit, Ride Within It

Ride only on trails that are not crowded and within his or her riding abilities.

Keep it Fun and Safe for Everyone

If you have several children riding at once, try to separate them. This will reduce the chances of their competing with each other, which could create dangerous situations.



Gear Up and Get Out

Make sure that your child has completed an approved rider-training course.

Equip every person with the proper clothing and essential protective gear

Some Simple Math

Youth-model ATVs are designed for varying ages, with differing speed limitations and parental controls for different categories.

Mandatory adult supervision required.





Comes from the factory set with a maximum speed of 16 km/h (10 mph), and can be adjusted by parents up to a maximum speed of 24 km/h (15 mph).



10 years of age



Comes from the factory set with a maximum speed of 24 km/h (15 mph), set can be adjusted by parents up to maximum speed of 40 km/h (30 mph).



12 years of age and older



Comes from the factory set with a maximum speed of 24 km/h (15 mph), and can be adjusted by generits up to a maximum speed of 48 km/h (30 mph).



14 years of age



Comes from the factory set with a meximum speed of 32 km/h (20 mph), and can be

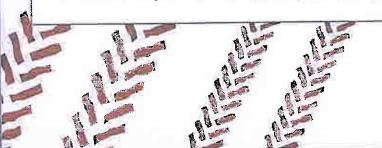
New (Transition) Category

speed of 32 km/n (70 man), and doe pe adjusted by parents to a maximum speed of of 45 km/h (30 mph) or 51 km/h (38 mph). 5



Size is Important

Young riders need to be able to easily reach all of the controls on their vehicle so that they can steer, brake and ride safely. You'll have a lot more fun riding an ATV that is the right size for you.





Safety in Numbers

When riding in a group, place one adult-ridden ATV in front of the ATV ridden by your child and another adult-ridden ATV behind.

Follow the Leader

If just one adult and child are riding, the adult-ridden ATV should be in front to better control the speed.



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
